## School Uniform Policy

### Mission Statement

"Let the light of Christ shine in us all."

### Standard Uniform

It is expected that parents who choose to send their children to St. Cuthbert's will comply with the wishes of the Governing Body, that school uniform is worn.

The Uniform for pupils of St. Cuthbert's R.C. Primary School is as follows: -

- **Grey** Trousers /shorts or Skirt/Pinafore. **(No black please!)**
- Maroon Sweatshirt /cardigan.
- White Polo Shirt.
- Plain socks/tights
- **Black shoes with plain black laces (No trainers)**
- Summer red check dress.

### Optional

- Maroon Fleece.
- Maroon Waterproof Jacket.

Girls may wear red and white checked or striped dresses in summer.

Children need to wear sensible footwear for school: no high soles or heels; as they spend time in the playground each day and sensible footwear is essential.

Sweatshirts, Polo shirts, Fleecees and waterproof Jackets, embroidered with the School badge and School name and the child's initials can be ordered at the school.

Parents are advised to sew name labels onto their child's clothing for identification purposes.

### P.E. and Swimming

Children need: -

- Black Shorts and White T-shirt for P.E.
- Suitable footwear: - Sandshoes for indoor wear and trainers for outdoor work.
- **(note)** The footwear worn for P.E. should not be the same shoes as were being worn in school before the lesson.

Pupils in years 3 and 4 classes also receive swimming lessons and require: -

- Towel, Bathing costume (**not swimming shorts**), Swimming hat.

### **Jewellery**

The practice of children wearing jewellery in school can constitute a Health and Safety risk. This risk is not only to the wearer but also to fellow pupils and staff. Because of this danger, The Governing Body of St. Cuthbert's has adopted Hartlepool Children's Services Code of Practice and has a policy of **not allowing** pupils to wear jewellery at school. Jewellery is defined as being, jewels or ornamental objects especially for personal adornment. Earrings, ear studs, rings, chains and bracelets are included.

Watches may be worn, but must be removed for P.E. and must be the responsibility of the pupil.

Over coloured hair and extreme hairstyles are against school rules.
